At price of Rs 6 the quantity demanded and supplied are equal,so it is the equilibrium price.

When the market price is less than the equilibrium price, quantity demanded will be more than quantity supplied as shown in the schedule.This is the situation of “excess demand”. At a price of Rs 5 there is excess demand.This leads to competition among buyers resulting in price rise.When price rises demand falls and supply rises.These changes continue till demand and supply are equal.

Similarly at a price of Rs 7, there is “excess supply”.This will result in competition among sellers.This will reduce price.When price falls demand will rise and supply will fall ultimately equilibrium is reached when price falls to Rs 6.

These are called legal reserves. The money lent comes back to it as deposits. Again it keeps a part of it with the central bank and a part with itself and lends the rest. This process continues.
