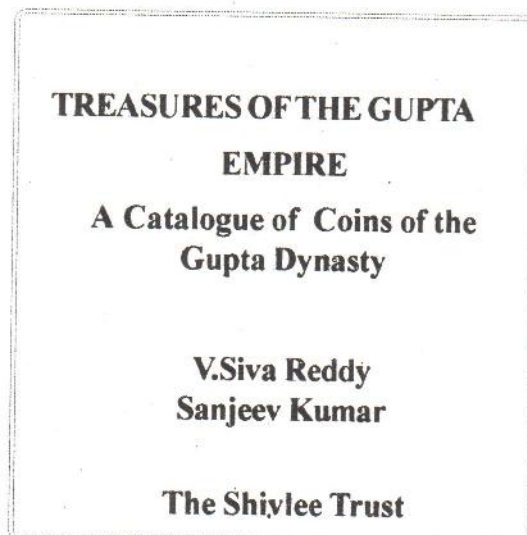
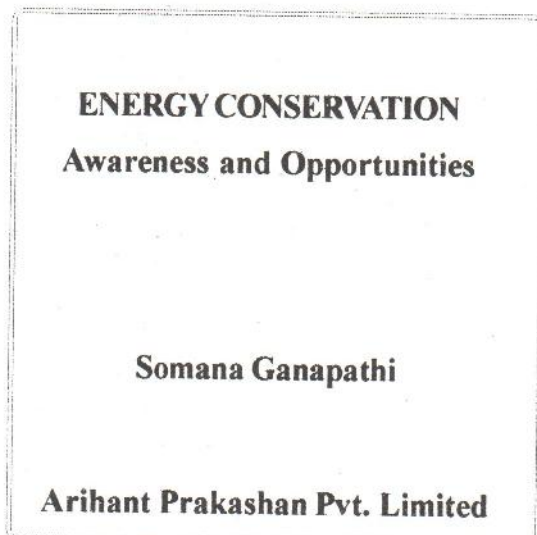
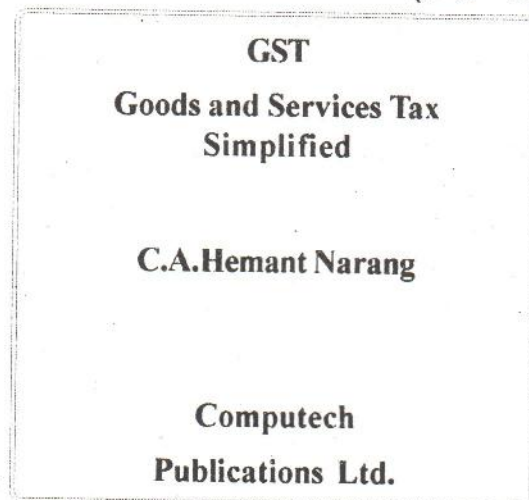
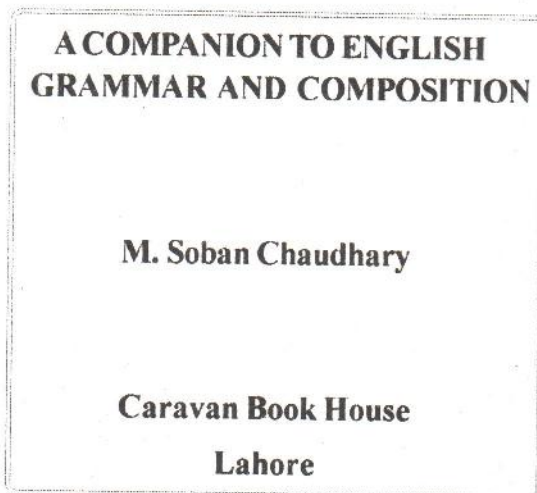
Qns.20-24. Answer any THREE of the following questions. Each question carries six scores. (6×3 = 18)
