All snakes are hunters and predators, feeding on the animals and sometimes their eggs. Having no limbs, snakes cannot hold their prey down to bite, hen e they usually swallow them whole. Poisonous snakes sometimes immobilize their preyes with their venom to make consumption easier.

Most poisonous snakes are conspicuously coloured to warn others off. Snakes like the cobras, which have less outstanding body colours, d splay their fatality by lifting the front part of their body and spreading their hoods. In general, there are three kinds of poisons in veno, though in varying amounts, depending on the type of snake in question. Venoms usually contain substances that weaken th blood vessels. Profuse bleeding often a common result of snake bites, is caused by the anticoagulants present in the poison which prevents blood clotting the paralysis of the heart and respiratory muscles is performed by the nervous system attacking toxins.

The poisonous venom usually travels fast into the body upon being release; hence, sucking at the mouth of the wound will not help remove the poison, ra he incising the bite may lead the victim to great pain. The victim must be duly sent to the hospital fo professional treatment.
